A conversation with an alumnus

It is always great to know about the progress made by our alumni and we regularly bring in more and more people to talk about their journey. This quarter, we have one of our esteemed alumni Mr. Rahul Patil. Our student Ms. Kajal Sonawane and Volunteer Ms. Shikha Hashilkar speak with Rahul in an open chat to know more about his journey.

Q - 1. We would love to know about your childhood and about your school life.

I was born and brought up in a small village - Mandane, Shahada Taluka in the Nandurbar district. I did my schooling in my native village and then pursued Diploma in Electronics Engineering from Government Polytechnic Mumbai (Bandra). After completing my Diploma in 2014, I did my bachelor's program in Electronic Engineering from K. K. Wagh Institute of Engineering - Nashik. In 2017, in the final year of BE, I got placed in a Nashik-based company, Rishabh Instruments Pvt Ltd. I worked there from July 2017 to June 2022. And recently, I joined L&T Technology Services (LTTS) - Vadodara location.





Q-2. What does your profile look like?

In Rishabh Instruments, I worked as an executive in Research & Development and now at L&T, I'm a Senior Engineer in Hardware Engineering Department.

Q-3. You spoke about your family background and also about what you have done in terms of educational qualification. So, would you like to brief us about what your childhood was like? What were your hobbies and things you liked to do the most? And even today, so, like a comparison between your hobbies back then and current ones.

Sure. I'm fond of trekking, walking, and watching the news. I used to walk daily 4 to 5 KMs in evenings. That evening time used to be special. I watch the news daily. I'm specifically interested in political news, so, I'm aware of all the major political affairs of Maharashtra and the whole country. In my childhood, I liked to work on farms. As my family's primary occupation has been farming, so, till the 10th grade, I used to do farming on the weekends. Now, on vacations, I try to help as much as possible.

Q-4. You have interesting hobbies, Rahul. And now we know, to whom we should redirect the students to for asking doubts about politics and the news around it. Going forward, we would like to ask how did you come in touch with GEF?

After completing my Diploma course, I took admission to the second year in the Degree program. At that time I was in need of financial support and one of my friend's sisters had taken support from GEF. She was in contact with Waychal Sir.

I got the contact details from the friend and contacted sir. After completing our GEF's onboarding process, I joined as a student of GEF Family.

Q-5. After connecting with GEF, what do you think on how GEF has helped you to grow professionally and at a personal level as well? Does it have any impact on your life?



Yes. GEF does not support only financially, but professionally as well as personally also. At GEF, my mentor was Sandhya Ma'am. So, sir and Sandhya Ma'am used to take regular follow-ups on my professional and personal growth. I learned many things from Waychal sir like how to speak, behave, and most importantly, how to think. GEF helped me holistically - financially, professionally, and personally too. I'm still in contact with Waychal sir. I take guidance and feedback related to professional decisions. Thus, the impact of GEF on my life is huge.

Q-6. From your preview response, I think Waychal sir and ma'am have had the maximum influence on your life. Or is there anybody else who too had influenced you?

No, I would like to mention that Waychal sir has influenced my life the most. His dedication and passion for social work has been inspiring me to work for the social welfare of society. He is the biggest motivator in my life.

Q-7. From your 4 years of professional experience, do you want to share any learning with us?

Let me share the first interview experience I had with Rishabh Instruments. During our campus placements, we first had KPIT (Pune). For KPIT, I cleared the Aptitude Test round and got

shortlisted in the Technical round as well. However, in the HR round, I was told that my Communication Skills were not good, and my Spoken English was not good. So, I was not selected. After that incident, I got depressed because I cleared all other rounds but got rejected due to my lack of Communication Skills. At the end of December, Rishabh Instruments came, and I cleared the first 2 rounds. They had GD (Group discussion) round and I was afraid of and doubtful whether I would be able to clear it or not. I tried my best and was shortlisted for the next round - the technical round. The interview experience was great. The interviewers' panel was comprised of 4-5 members and my interview discussion went on for a prolonged period of 2 days.

During the interview, I was facing difficulties in answering in English but the HR officials allowed me to use Marathi, whenever required. It gave me tremendous confidence and my nervousness and anxiety decreased

In the job, my supervisor, Mr. Tushar Shah had an impact on my professional growth. I got to learn many skills from him. I am really thankful to him.

Q-8 Can you tell us the most challenging situation that happened in your life? Like this interview incident or maybe something else you consider the most challenging thing. And how did you handle it?



In my previous job at Rishabh Instruments, in the R&D department, there was a challenge of doing EMC testing that was happening only in a few Government Laboratories. So, our management decided to set up our own testing laboratory, which incurred huge costs. The laboratory enabled the EMC testing in-house but the management felt that we should get some ROI on this huge investment. Also, this would help other industries which were facing similar issues, so it'll become a win-win situation.

Since this was a totally new subject, there was no sales knowledge available in this domain. Management asked me if I would like to take this challenge of getting new business. For me, it was very challenging because I was not a salesperson and I didn't have much knowledge of EMC Testing. After setting up the laboratory, I had a basic idea about the testing. When I began it was definitely a struggle.

All the electronic industries were mandated to perform EMC Testing. So, I started checking the websites of industries that might need this testing facility and generated e-mail & mobile number lists of these industries. Then, I started mailing them, the details of the laboratory & also started calling on their numbers.

In my first year, I had no target, I was just asked to do the task at my

own pace. But, in the following 3 years, I overperformed on this task by around 150%. I received appreciation from the owner of the firm for the same.

Q-9. What was the process and the key skill needed to achieve the success you just mentioned?

For any such challenge, patience is a very key skill required. Initially, when I was not able to understand and perform the task, I was patient. Another, key skill required is hard work. For those 2 years, I barely came home from the office before 9 PM. I used to complete my daily work in normal 9-5 hours and after that used to give around 4 hours for this task. For the initial 2-3 months, I used to e-mail and call people but there was no response. So, patience and hard work are two very important skills required.

Q-10. What are your future plans?

As I already said, I want to do social work, I have many ideas for social work. Not exactly like Waychal Sir is doing. I want to give society back from where I have come. With this intention and some political work, I hope I will be able to do something. For now, nothing is fixed, but let's see what happens in the future. But sometime in my life, I want to do social work.



Q-11.So, you want to combine politics and social work. I think something great will come out of this. We'll be waiting for your start on this journey. The last question for you Rahul, is there any message you'd like to give to the GEF students?

Yes, the guidance and mentorship the students are getting are very important and the students should follow them well. For example, the students should regularly attend the different programs & classes that are being run by GEF. Also, in life, you need to have patience. Also, there is no shortcut to success, you need to work hard to achieve anything in life.

Q-12. One last question Rahul, what is success to you? When will you say that you've achieved success in life?

Learning and success are two processes that'll never be complete. Though, if we achieve a milestone in professional life, another milestone becomes visible to achieve.

Just like learning is a never-ending process, similarly, success is also a never-ending process, it will keep going on.
